Hope House is struggling to get approval for a new residence for expectant mothers in need. This is a great opportunity to reach across to the other side and show support for our community by writing our aldermen and/or attending the upcoming City Council meeting to voice support. "The City Planning Commission has recommended denial of our zoning request. They have been very helpful, but there has been abundant and strong resistance from the neighbors. We understand their feelings, but feel strongly that Hope House will be an asset to the neighborhood.

On July 7 our case goes before the city council and they will make the decision whether it moves forward or not. If you live in the city of Quincy would you take a moment to call or email your alderman?
